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3	A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF
4	OAKLAND PARK, FLORIDA, EXPRESSING ITS OPPOSITION
5	TO OFFSHORE OIL DRILLING IN FLORIDA WATERS AS
6	HAVING A DELETERIOUS IMPACT ON FLORIDA'S
7	ENVIRONMENTAL AND ECONOMIC RESOURCES;
8	DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK TO TRANSMIT A COPY OF
9	THIS RESOLUTION TO VARIOUS STATE AND FEDERAL
10	OFFICIALS; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR
11	SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.
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13	WHEREAS, Florida's clear clean waters, word-class beaches and coral reed
14	draw millions of visitors each year, supports a \$53 billion tourism industry, a \$1
15	billion marine industry and a fishing industry that injects more than \$6 billion a year t
16	Florida communities; and
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18	WHEREAS, Florida's tourism industry generated \$13.3 billion in payroll t
19	over 1 million Floridians directly employed in tourism; and
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21	WHEREAS, Florida's tourism industry generated over \$65 billion in 2008 t
22	Florida's economy and the sales tax revenue derived there from constitute a significant
23	portion of the State's budget; and
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25	WHEREAS, Florida's leaders from both major political parties have historicall
26	recognized the value of our shorelines to our economy; and

28	WHEREAS, Hurricanes Katrina and Rita resulted in 125 spills from platforms
29	rigs and pipelines totaling 685,000 gallons of oil lost into the sea; and
30	WITEDEAC because it misses are determined on the intermetional modern
31 32	WHEREAS, because oil prices are determined on the international market, an impact that offshore drilling in Florida waters might have on the wellhead prices i
33	expected to be insignificant; and
33 34	expected to be misignificant, and
35	WHEREAS, any oil spill event in the Gulf of Mexico would cause harm to
36	Florida's tourism-based economy and could bring ecological damage to For
37	Lauderdale's beach by way of the loop current; and
38	Education 5 bodden by way of the loop editorit, and
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1 WHEREAS, oil spill events emanating from allowing offshore oil drilling in 2 Florida's waters will significantly jeopardize Florida's pristine waters, world-class 3 beaches, coral reefs, negatively impact the tourism industry and State revenue; 4 5 WHEREAS, Florida's economy depends on its multi-billion dollar tourism 6 industry, which resulted in more than 82 million visitors coming to Florida in 2008, 7 during which period tourism generated over \$4.0 billion in taxable sales; and 8 9 WHEREAS, tourism account for one-third of Florida's budget revenue and 10 96% of those visitors cite the beaches as an influential factor in their decision to visit 11 Florida; and 12 13 WHEREAS, tax revenues generated from Florida's growing tourism industry 14 are critical to continued funding of essential governmental services, including 15 transportation, schools, and public safety; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the testing and training ranges of the eastern Gulf of Mexico are a 18 unique and irreplaceable national security asset that provides critical live-fire testing 19 and training opportunities that are incompatible with mineral exploration and 20 extraction; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the area with the potential for the greatest risk of environmental 23 damage is the eastern part of the Gulf of Mexico, off the western coast of Florida; and 24 25 WHEREAS, environmental specialists contend the major risk from drilling 26 platforms is the wastewater they routinely discharge which contains drilling fluids and 27 heavy metals including mercury; and 28 29 WHEREAS, according to Oil Industry data, an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico 30 can dump up to 90,000 tons of drilling fluid and metal cuttings over its lifetime. These 31 contaminants accumulate in the marine flood web and may contaminate local beaches 32 and have a negative effect on the environment and the tourism industry; and 33 34 WHEREAS, it is our belief that despite technological advances in oil drilling 35 technology, there is no positive assurance that catastrophic damage to our coastline, 36 beaches, plant, and fish life could be avoided during normal operating conditions or 37 during storm situations; and 38 39 WHEREAS, lifting the moratorium on mineral leasing in the Gulf of Mexico 40 poses an intolerable threat to the beaches, waterways, economy of Florida, and national

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security; and

1	WHEREAS, the United States government has expressed interest in opening
2	the Atlantic Ocean and Eastern Gulf of Mexico to offshore oil and gas developmen
3	and exploration, including risky methods such as seismic air gun blasting; and,
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5	WHEREAS, seismic air guns fire intense blasts of compressed air, one of the
6	loudest manmade sounds in the ocean, every 10-12 seconds for days, weeks, or months
7	on end; and,
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. 9	WHEREAS, seismic air gun noise has been shown to harm and injure
10	dolphins, whales, endangered sea turtles, fish, and other marine life; and,
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12	WHEREAS, exploratory and commercial drilling, extraction, and
13	transportation of offshore oil and gas resources pose a significant risk of oil spills and
14	chronic leakage; and,
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16	NOW, THEREFORE, the City Commission of the City of Oakland Park
17	Florida urges the United States federal government not to pursue or allow
18	offshore oil and gas drilling, exploration, or development in the Atlantic Ocean of
19	the East Coast of the State of Florida and states that:
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21	SECTION 1. The foregoing "WHEREAS" clauses are true and correct and
22	hereby ratified and confirmed by the City Commission. All exhibits attached hereto are
23	hereby incorporated herein.
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25	SECTION 2. The City Commission of the City of Oakland Park, Florida,
26	hereby expresses its opposition to offshore oil drilling including seismic air gun
27	blasting in Florida waters in areas other than those already approved for oil leasing and
28	oil exploration and to take immediate steps to encourage and assist in the development
29 .	of alternative sources of energy.
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31	SECTION 3. The appropriate City officials are authorized and directed to
32	execute the necessary documents to comply with this Resolution.
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34	SECTION 4. All Resolutions or parts of Resolutions in conflict herewith, be
35	and the same are repealed to the extent of such conflict.
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1 2 3 4	SECTION 5. If any clause, section or other part of this Resolution shall be held by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, such unconstitutional or invalid part shall be considered eliminated and will in no way affect the validity of the other provisions of this Resolution.
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6	SECTION 6. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its
7	passage and adoption.
